From the Pastor's Pen

Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping. (Luke 26:40).

This is one of the disciples' lowest points. Jesus is pleading for his life, literally sweating blood, and his followers who have vowed to stay with him until the bitter end are sacked out cold. The older I get, though, the more I see how that's possible. They're tired and tired people need sleep. It's eleven o'clock on a Sunday night and I'm tired, too. I'm not sleeping now, though. I'm writing this newsletter article that was due six days ago. I'm working on this doctorate that never seems to end. I got myself on this presbytery restructuring committee that's about to kill me. I taxi my children all over town for music lessons and soccer practice... It's a fast paced world. So if it's late, I see how Jesus' disciples might have passed out.

It's easy to look back at our ancestors and wonder why they didn't do more. I wonder, for example, when my ancestors saw that their fellow human beings were being sold like cattle into slavery, why they didn't do anything. I imagine that they were doing the same thing I'm doing. When the roll is called up yonder and God asks me why I didn't do anything about the millions of Syrian refugees who were dying of hunger, or about immigrant families being ripped apart while I enjoyed the fruits of their cheap labor... I wonder if my answers will suffice. "I had to lead a Bible study on Hosea," I'll respond, or "those sermons came around every week back then," or "I had children and children need attention..." I wonder if that will suffice. Or if it won't be something more like, "Then Jesus came to Luke and found him sleeping." I wonder.

I don't pretend to have all the answers. We're all busy with good things. God doesn't need us to bring in the Kingdom, after all. The Resurrection happens despite our best efforts to stop it. The world's hope is not that we Christians finally get our act together. The world's hope is that Jesus is Lord. That's true whether we pay attention or not.

But the issues of the day demand that we do something, or at the very least say something. We know, after all, that every one of those Syrian refugees is a beloved child of God Almighty. And we know that in God's eyes, people can never be illegal. They may do something illegally, but they themselves are not illegal. That's an important distinction. They are God's very own children, just as much as we are. We do something, after all, not to change the world, much less save it. We do something because God in Christ already has.

So go do what you have to do. I get it. And get your eight hours of sleep. I get that, too. But don't get caught sleeping on life's most important matters. Sometimes those important matters are mundane activities like driving children to music lessons or studying Hosea. But sometimes, they get us out in the issues of the day, where the rubber meets the road, where people are hurting, where injustice seems to reign supreme. We know better. Only Jesus reigns. Go live and do accordingly.

THE BEGINNING OF THE CONVERSATION



"We've tried all these years to scapegoat Judas, tried to point the finger at somebody else. But if we fail to recognize Judas dwelling also in ourselves, we have missed the point of the gospel. If we do not acknowledge Judas as our brother, we miss the essence of redemption. And if we continue to silence the voice of Judas, we lose two things — first, we lose something of our humanity; and second, we lose the profound experience of God's love. For as someone has put it, "Judas is not the original betrayer; Judas is not the primal betrayer; Judas is only the typical betrayer."

In the chapel at Austin Seminary, which is a beautiful gothic jewel of a place, a kind of cathedral in miniature, there's a wall that separates the nave (or the sanctuary, as we sometimes call it) from the narthex. And across that wall, just above the doors that take you out of the nave and through the narthex to the outside, are carvings of the shields of all the disciples — twelve of them, disciples who became apostles. I can look at those shields now and identify who they stand for. There's Peter and Andrew and James and John and Phillip and Bartholomew and Thomas and Matthew and James the son of Alphaeus and Thaddeus and Simon the Canaanite...and then there's Matthias. He was the one who was added later, to replace you-know-who.

If I had just a little bit more courage than in fact I have, I would design a shield for Judas too, and put it up there with all the rest. It might disturb the symmetry of things, but I think he belongs up there. St. Judas. Conflicted and dysfunctional and wrong as he no doubt was, he was no more imperfect than anybody else on that wall.

After all, he's not the one who died for us. Jesus is. And across these may centuries, just like he promised, Jesus still waits to meet us — waits to meet all of us, even Judas — at the world's most welcoming table."



AKILAH'S YAV ADVENTURE

Hair

I love my hair. I really, really, really do! At home, there are so many people with similar hair, but my hair is unique to me. I'd like to believe that I am not vain, but no one else has my coloring. No one else has my curl pattern. People tend to comment that I look like my mom in my normal hair-style and I do love those comments. I love my hair. But, my hair has brought up some unique experiences since I've been in the Philippines. By the way, did I mention that I love my hair?

To an outsider, the Philippines seems to be a pretty homogenous place compared to the United States, which means almost everyone has the same facial structure, general physique, and – you guessed it – hair type! So, when I come along, and visit places or meet people that don't see many foreigners (especially African-Americans) I, honestly, tend to be slightly violated. Let me explain...

In America, we know that there are different types of hair textures. Not everyone realizes that, here in the Philippines. The mildest question I've gotten is "Is it a wig?" I can answer that, easily – No, it is not a wig. I guess that's a fair question. I wonder if I said, "None of anyone's business," but really questions are ok and I am not that rude. Moving beyond the "asking questions" is where the problem lies.

In America, we (should) know that you need to ask before touching someone's hair. It can be very rude to just walk up to someone and play with his or her hair. In some of the places I've been, that isn't a well-known concept. In Bohol, during my third week in the Philippines, my fellow YAVs and I toured a local elementary school. The children spent the entire time trying to be sneaky and touch my hair, as if I wouldn't notice it (they ran away when I actually offered to let them touch it...). But, they were children, they didn't know better, so I didn't think too much of it. But what really offended me, was that one Sunday, the pastor (and our host) started playing with my hair...in the middle of her sermon! The children, I can understand, but a grown woman, who is in the middle of a sermon, and did not ask permission, just decided she wanted play with my hairreally? I simply wasn't fine with that, but I let it go, to give people the benefit of the doubt, especially since we were in a very rural area where they don't see many foreigners. My dad told me about his similar experiences in China- well

not his hair since he normally wears it bald, but how people grope, take pictures, and stare. However, now I truly understand.

And finally, in America, and hopefully everywhere else, we know that it is extremely rude to pull someone's hair, even if you are a child. It hurts! If you've had your hair pulled, you know that it hurts. Apparently, that didn't matter to these children. I was sitting with a friend eating dinner and a few of the street children walk past our table and I feel a tug at my hair. I turn around and there are at least 6 children behind me. One of them asked if it was a wig, so I give my usual nswer, "No!" My real problem begins when they continue to pull my hair, not tug – pull. When I finally was able to get them to stop and leave, I thought it was over. Except, every time they walked past me that night, they pulled my hair and not my fellow YAV's hair. That was probably one of the most infuriating things I've had to deal with since arriving in the Philippines.

Like I've said, I love, love, love my hair. Unfortunately, it has brought me many experiences that I could've done without. However, I've had the experiences, I've had multiple opportunities to practice patience, learn empathy, and extend forgiveness, and I'm (hopefully) a better person because of those experiences. But, I'm also TOTALLY fine with forgoing any future hair-violating experiences, regardless of one's age.
